

- Materialism erodes values, and love becomes transactional.

Characters & Relationships



- Nick Carraway: narrator; cousin to Daisy; observer of others
- Jay Gatsby: mysterious millionaire; enamoured with Daisy
- Daisy Buchanan: object of Gatsby's dream; married to Tom
- Tom Buchanan: Daisy's husband; arrogant and supercilious
- Jordan Baker: friend of Daisy; professional golfer; Nick's interest
- Myrtle & George Wilson: working-class couple; tragic victims

Symbols & Motifs

- Green Light: hope and unattainable dreams
- Valley of Ashes: moral and social decay
- Eyes of Dr. T.J. Eckleburg: ever-watchful judgement
- Time & Clocks: the past cannot be repeated
